

Luke has released **Believer**, his second single to radio, headlined the prestigious **Blues on Broadbeach Festival**, performed for Australia's troops in **Afghanistan** and on **Friday July 2nd** his debut album Underdog will be released.

Luke is an independent artist and is proud of the music he has created the way he wanted to create it. As a result the album is an honest and endearing body of work that reflects something of the Australian psyche.

Hailed as the best new thing in Australian music Luke's album & show has something for everyone taking cues from the Blues, Funk and of course good old aussie rock. Tracks like **Underdog** will have audiences tapping their feet and busting some moves while **Home to Stay**, the story of working away from home and being away from loved ones is something everyone can relate too.

The Underdog tour audiences will also be treated to a couple of Luke's old favourites from Joe Cocker to Michael Jackson. Bringing with him his 4 piece band, who between them have worked with The Badloves, Shannon Noll, Guy Sebastian, & the Whitlams; the Underdog Show is great value from one of Australia's best up and coming talents.

Upgrading the School Grounds

There is steady progress underway as we near the beginning of the major works on the school grounds. The tireless efforts of the Parents and Citizens Association of our school, combined with the generous support of the Department of Education, is now seeing results which will enormously enhance the appearance, safety and functioning of Yass High.

In the past few weeks soil testing and surveying has been conducted by SMEC, Snowy Mountains Engineering Corporation, which is the company engaged by the Council to prepare the preliminary work on the site. These works include:

- Upgrading works of the internal roads, including some widening of the roads and the provision of an on-road cycleway
- ✓ A new car-park facility
- ✓ A new shared pedestrian path/cycleway to link with the existing network
- Pedestrian facilities at critical crossing locations along with pedestrian refuges and traffic calming devices
- Two dedicated drop off and pick up areas, one for our school buses and one for private vehicles
- ✓ The provision of safe pedestrian access to and from the school buildings
- ✓ Major earthworks to create a sporting oval provided with underground irrigation
- ✓ Various landscaping works which include drainage, road pavement and curbing.

The Development Application is on view at the Council and we are at present conducting a Review of Environmental Factors related to the works. The areas of interest are the impact on flora, fauna and waterways, any aesthetic impacts, public access and safety as well as any heritage and social concerns with the project.

It is important to note that not only will the students and the wider school community benefit from the cooperation of the Council and the Department of Education. The major works taking place on the oval adjacent to our school will provide a significant addition to Victoria Park as a sporting facility for our town.

I am told works will start in July. There will no doubt be major changes needed in our driving habits and in the pick-up and drop off of students, as well as the entry and exit of buses, when the works begin. There will be a formal Occupational Health and Safety Risk Management process undertaken and we all will be informed about the necessary changes to the movement of cars, buses and students on the site during the different stages of the works.

Resurfacing of the basket ball court will take place after winter. Once the frosts have gone, a new rebound ace surface will be laid. This is possible because of the generous support that the P&C gives our school. The work will commence at the end of Term 3 and be completed over the holidays. This will then provide an excellent facility in combination with the COLA that now covers the court.

Please ensure that students are wearing protective covered shoes so that they can take part in practical activities.





They attended workshops on exam preparation, being organised, improving their memories and relaxation (to encourage a balanced approach to school work). Last week, they put those skills into practice, completing their Preliminary Half Yearly exams in the school hall. It is the first of five exam periods they will take part in over the next two years, culminating in their external HSC exams next October and November.

Year 10 selecting subjects for Year 11

We will soon start the process that finishes with each Year 10 student enrolling in their classes for Year 11 in 2011. Yass HS conducts a number of activities to assist students and parents with these important decisions. If you have a child in Year 10, it is important for you to attend as many of the parent sessions as possible. Each session has a very different focus.

Careers Expo Day at Yass HS - At these workshops students have the opportunity to find out about training and employment opportunities. This information can inform students about subjects they may need to consider for Year 11.

What is the HSC? Parent Evening - On Monday 28 June 2010 Lindy Billing, a representative from the Board of Studies will present an evening session starting at 6 pm in the school Library on the requirements for the HSC. A letter for all parents of Year 10 students will be distributed closer to the date.

Planning for the HSC Student Workshops - On Monday 28 June 2010 during Periods 6 & 7, Lindy Billing will conduct some workshops with Year 10 students to start their planning for selecting subjects for Year 11.

Student Interviews - Ms Robinson, the Careers Advisor, will conduct an individual interview with each student in Year 10 during the first couple of weeks in Term 3.

Parent Teacher Interviews – On Tuesday 27th July 2010, interviews you will have the opportunity to ask your child's teachers how your child is achieving this year and what options are available for your child continuing those subjects into Year 11.


Are you ready? Student Day - On Friday 6 August 2010, all Year 10 students will be involved in a range of activities to learn about the requirements for subjects in Year 11. There will guest speakers and teachers from the school to provide information about moving into the workplace and the possible subject offerings at Yass HS.

Year 10 into 11 Parent Information Evening - On Thursday 12 August 2010, there will be a parent information session held in the school Library where staff from the school will provide information about the subject selection process for Year 11. Near this time, students in Year 10 will receive a Subject Information Book.

Students at Yass HS are fortunate to be attending a school with a highly qualified staff. The staff at Yass HS have qualifications which would enable us to teach any one of over forty different subjects. The students put in preferences on which subjects they would like to undertake in Year 11. From these student preferences, a selection of subjects is made which enables the most students to undertake those subjects they most want to do. Consideration is given to a balance of subjects for our academically gifted students who want an ATAR, our students who want a artistic program and those students who want a program to support them moving into the workplace.

Codarra Robot Challenge

Over the past few months the year 11 and 12 IT classes entered themselves into a robot challenge. This challenge involved getting a team together to participate in the competition. When we had made a team which was Naomi Menzies, Tierney Boel and Anthony Eades we were then set to go. We then had to build a robot from a kit that was supplied to the school from Codarra Advanced Systems. After that we had to think about the designs of the robot which took a while since we were all too busy playing games and just playing around with the robot bits.


It came close to the time of the competition and that's when we started to panic because nothing had been done. We had to make a design, quickly and learn how to program. Since one of our team members had left we had to find replacement which was Tom O'Brien. He was a life saver as Naomi and Anthony needed a programmer. Naomi was the reporter and builder, Anthony was the builder and part programmer. We were very close to the competition date.

We quickly built a robot that would suit the courses. We finalised our programs for the robot and then it was time for the competition. The

competition day was quite fun as Naomi, Tom and Anthony ran around the hall where the competition was held, trying to complete the courses to get lots of points.

Our first course was the flag event (diagram number 1). Use didn't do too well in this event since our sensor wasn't working properly and we needed the sensor to follow the to our flag. The second event (diagram number 2) was the cube event. We succeeded at this event as our robot did exactly what we wanted it to do which was to take the cube and put it in the target area and we got the full marks that you could get for this event.

The third event (diagram number 3) was the maze event where the robot had to navigate around the obstacles and make it out in the shortest amount of time. The fourth event (diagram number 4) which was the drag race. We had trouble on this course as our robot did not want to go straight.

At the end of the day we came 7th out of 25 schools which is pretty good considering this is our first year at this competition. We were very impressed with most of our results and are ready to beat the other schools next year.

New Tractor for Yass High

On Tuesday the 25th May Yass High School finally received the brand new tractor they have been waiting for, paid for by the Department of Education. The tractor is equipped with numerous safety features including;

- Remote control kill switch which enables teachers to be up to 300 metres away and still able to maintain control of the tractor.
- Speaker that beeps when in reverse
- Indicators and lights
- Mushroom switch next to the driver
- Seat belt
- Safety bar to prevent students getting on the wrong side of the tractor
- It is also able to be locked on a slow speed for first time drivers
- Adjustable seat and steering wheel

All these features are provided to make the tractor a safe piece of farm machinery for students of any age to learn to drive and, once confident enough, to complete tasks around the farm.


Over time Agriculture teacher, Mr Phil Armour is hoping to get enough funding to purchase a front end loader for the tractor.



School Chaplain visits weekly

Each Monday, Helena Painting and Daniel Neuhaus have been visiting the school at lunchtime, bringing music, games, opportunities to think about social issues and even hot chips to the students of Yass High. The program is sponsored by the rural churches and may expand into other areas, such as courses on esteem and resilience, as the need arises.

On Monday 7th June our local ministers will present another series of Religious Seminars to students. These occur once a term and are held in the school hall. Last term, the focus was on 'Making Poverty History' and students were challenged to imagine living in very poor conditions. The seminars are not about teaching specific religious beliefs but rather invite students to consider social justice matters and discuss issues involving personal choice and the consequences of decisions. Students who do not wish to attend the seminars are supervised in a classroom for the period.

Careers

Girls Try-a-Trade

A group of Year 10 girls recently spent the day at CIT for Girls Try-a-Trade day. They participated in 3 practical workshops in the state of the art facilities at the Fyshwick campus. The girls successfully made small items that they could take home in trades such as Plumbing, Automotive, Painting, Carpentry, Welding, Electrical and Hospitality.

Tradezone is a new course offered by CIT. It is designed as an introduction to trade training.

It provides training in the selection, maintenance and

use of tools in a range of trades in state of the art workshop facilities including automotive, metals, plumbing, refrigeration/air-conditioning and electrical trades. Experienced teachers will provide insights into a variety of trade courses. Twelve lucky boys from year 9 & 10 will be selected to participate in the course this year.

Occupational Health & Safety

There will be an OH&S course conducted at the school on Wednesday the 16th June. This course delivers the elevated platform

All year 10 students will be participating in work experience during Week 8 in Term 4 from 29th November to 3rd December. They need to begin discussing their options with their parents and their network now so that arrangements can be made in time.

The necessary forms and paperwork will be distributed soon in Careers Lessons.



Driver Education

A free workshop for parents and current supervisors (or soon-to-be supervisors) of learner drivers will be held on Tuesday 22nd June 2010 starting at 7 pm, facilitated by Yass Valley Council Road Safety Officer, Alison Beresford.

Visit to Mulloon Creek Natural Farms

Last month Year 12 Geography and the Support Unit students visited Mulloon Creek Natural Farms at Bungendore. This was part of their respective syllabus study requirements on environmental issues. The farm is based on the principles of Peter Andrews who believes we need to rehydrate the landscape and regenerate farms through biodynamic principles which are organic, dynamic and regenerative. Food can be grown while making a profit as well.

The students were given a talk about the operation of the farm and then they went on a two kilometre walk with guides explaining how stream flow is slowed by using dams and weirs. The creek banks use vegetation to hold the soil together to stop erosion and water is channelled back over the land using runnels. This rehydrates the land and raises the water table.

Thanks to Mr Sicklen, Ms Chapman and Mrs Croker for their time and efforts. The students were excellent ambassadors for our school and they all enjoyed the day. This was an excellent example of integrated learning.

Visit by Vietnam Veterans Association

This is the third year in a row we have had the Vietnam Veterans Association giving a presentation to Year 10 history students about Australia's role in the Vietnam War. It complements what they are learning as part of their mandatory studies for the course.

Eddie Blanche, who completed two tours of Vietnam, highlighted many aspects of the war and the treatment of our soldiers both in Vietnam and at home during the 1960s and 1970s. Many students asked questions and Eddie gave informative responses.

Australians are now engaged in theatres of war in places such as Afghanistan and the Middle East. We as a nation are becoming more aware of our role in world affairs.

Yass Courthouse Visits

Dr Ray Stanton is taking his Year 11 Legal Studies to the local courthouse to observe the law in action. The students have seen a few cases and have gained from this experience. It adds value to their classroom lessons. Dr Stanton worked with the Federal Police before becoming a teacher and he has a wealth of experience to share with his class.

New Staff in HSIE

It is pleasing to welcome Mr Simon Bath to our faculty teaching history and geography. Mr Bath has taught previously in Bourke and before that lived and worked in Japan and other South East Asian countries. He has shown an infectious enthusiasm so far in his lessons and the students are benefiting from his wide knowledge and experience of other countries. He has also helped other faculty members to improve their information technology skills.




My Girrangundi


