




PBS Postcards

Students in the Support class have designed five striking and attractive posters based around our school values of respect, responsibility, safety and learning.


Their designs have been used to produce postcards by Academy Photographics, who take our school photos. We will be sending the postcards home to parents of




students who have shown commitment to school values through their positive behavior and contribution to the school.

Cyber Information Sessions

Last Tuesday, Police Liaison Officer Senior Constable David Brown ran information sessions about legal issues around the use of computers and other technology for students in Years 7 to 11.

What became clear during the workshops was that although many students regularly use mobile phones and social networking sites, they did not always know what their rights and responsibilities were with regard to this technology.

Some important points discussed on the day were:

- The legal age at which you can open a Facebook account is 14, so many students are putting the wrong age in order to access the service
- By ticking the box as you open an account, you are saying yes to a licencing agreement which means that Facebook owns your words and images and can use them in the future
- Popular sites are open to everybody, that means adults who may want to take advantage of children
- Adults may use teenage language and shorthand to make you think they are younger
- When you use a mobile phone, you leave behind a 'digital footprint' which police can follow to identify you
- Be careful about chatting to people when you don't really know who they are
- Stay anonymous, don't give personal details and be very careful about posting photos –you may be judged by these in the future

Rights and Responsibilities

Students and their parents are reminded of the importance of considering both the rights of students at Yass High School and the responsibilities that go with them. This excerpt from the school's Welfare Booklet sums it up well.

School Contact via SMS

The school is introducing a system where parents may be sent an SMS message to their mobile phone whenever their child is absent from school. The system may be expanded in the near future to also contact parents when their child is late to school.

The purpose is to contact parents on the day of the absence so that they can be kept better informed as to the location and safety of their child. Parents will then be able to reply to the SMS or ring the school to either explain the absence or to inform us if they believe their child is at school, so that we can investigate the matter further. I believe that most parents will appreciate the peace-of-mind that such a system would bring. As an added bonus, we will also be able to use the system to inform parents of special events and notices such as athletics/swimming carnivals, parent-teacher evenings, P&C meetings, overdue library books, etc.

In order to implement such a system, the school needs to ensure that it has accurate and verified mobile phone contact numbers for parents. Parents will be asked to nominate the mobile number they would prefer the text message to be sent to. Parents are also asked to keep the school promptly informed of any changes to phone numbers. From time-to-time the school will also randomly contact parents on these numbers to ensure that they are still current. These measures are all essential in ensuring that the system is as effective as possible. Parents who do not wish to be contacted via an SMS message to their mobile phone will have the option of receiving a printed summary of unexplained absences each fortnight. Naturally, we would prefer to contact parents via an SMS message, as this will provide much more timely and useful information than a fortnightly printout.

To start off this process we ask that all parents complete the slip below and return it to the school prior to **17**th **September 2010**. Parents can have their child hand the form to the office, post it to the school in an envelope or even bring it to the school themselves.

Start Smart

Hot on the heels of their groundbreaking 2009 program, the 2010 Commonwealth Bank Foundation Start Smart Workshops aim to blaze a trail to over 140 regional centres Australia wide. Last year Start Smart visited over 100 towns and was met with an overwhelming positive response from teachers and students alike.

Year 10 group at Yass High School were given the opportunity to be part of the exciting Start Smart Workshops again in 2010.

On Thursday 5th August Year 10 students participated in an interactive workshop promoting skills and knowledge around financial literacy.

The 2-hour workshop presented a fresh approach to areas of earning, saving, spending and investing. In this program, year 10 students were encouraged to explore issues about money through interactive games, engaging personal stories and interactive multimedia presentations.

The content for the workshops has been especially developed based on the results of the Australian Financial Literacy Assessment. It targets the key areas of trouble for students such as: managing your mobile phone, saving and budgeting, getting your first job, controlling your spending, and understanding simple investments.


The place we went next was "The Blacks Camp". We saw some metal tubs that they used in those days for baths. Uncle Eric then found a fire drum.

We used public transport, especially trains and ferries and it was a great learning experience for students who someday may live in urban Sydney. The case study material for Year 12 Business Studies and Geography students will be beneficial for their HSC exams coming up later in the year.

Year 10 Geography Fieldwork On Traffic Flows In Yass

As part of their mandatory fieldwork studies Year 10 geography recently went down to Comur Street to observe the traffic flows over three fifteen minute time periods. They recorded their observations of trucks, cars, buses, motorbikes and other vehicles and tallied their results. Traffic flows were monitored in each direction at two intersections (the traffic lights and the roundabout near the courthouse).

By comparing the three time periods the students were able to draw conclusions from their primary data and allow for any discrepancies in the data collection. It was found that traffic increased towards three o'clock as the time for school closure approached.

The students now have to write an in class report about their findings.

Verbal Combat

Supporting the comprehensive learning environment we offer at Yass High School, we strive to facilitate as many guest speakers and performers as possible exposing our students to new and varied learning experiences.

Brainstorm Productions have won the NSW Performing Arts Frater Award – "Best feedback from Schools" category for the last five years.



On Wednesday 18th August 2010, year 8 and 9 students observed a presentation by Brainstorm Productions, *Verbal Combat.* The play was action packed, engaging the audience with an important message for students.

WHERE can they go if or when they are being bullied? HOW can we stop it happening?

Verbal Combat is a cleverly constructed performance which invited students to examine these questions AND their own behaviour.





Year 10 Work Experience

This year all students in Year 10 have the opportunity to do a week of Work Experience in Term 4. Work Experience will occur in Week 8 from the 29th November to the 3rd December 2010.

Students have been given the forms and information booklets to take home and have been asked to discuss possible placements with their parents. Arrangements need to be made and completed forms given to Ms Robinson by the end of term. Students who leave their arrangements to the last minute often miss out on the place they want.

Students can do Work Experience out of Yass if a suitable place cannot be found locally. Travel and accommodation forms need to be completed where required.

Portfolios and Résumés

These are due soon for all year 10 classes. They have been working on a résumé in class and should be collecting all their reports, awards, certificates, references etc for their portfolios at home.



It was a pleasure to be a part of the HSC Body of Work exhibition of Caitlin Nelson held at the old Sheep's Back Gallery on Sunday 22nd August. Helping Learner Drivers Become Safer Drivers

A free workshop for parents and current supervisors (or soon-to-be supervisors) of learner drivers will be held on Monday 13 th September 2010 starting at 6.30 pm, facilitated by Yass Valley Council Road Safety Officer, Alison Beresford.

The course, **Helping Learner Drivers Become Safer Drivers**, developed by the RTA offers parents and supervisors, hands-on advice on how to provide the most effective driving practice for learner drivers.

"The June workshop was well received by those who attended with the feedback being overwhelmingly positive" says Ms Beresford, "Council is pleased to be able to offer this evening again to the parents and supervisors of learner drivers in our area. It is well recognised that parents and supervisors of novice drivers have a crucial role to play in making our roads safer".

The RTA developed course covers such topics as:

- planning on-road driving sessions
- laws for learner and P-plate drivers.
- how to use the new Learner Driver Log Book

"Parents and supervisors who have attended this course found it boosted their confidence, assisted them to better plan driving sessions and found the practical exercises helped them apply and reinforce information gained during the evening." Ms Beresford said.

Under the current Graduated Licensing Scheme there is a minimum of one year on 'L' plates with 120 hours of supervised driving, including a mandatory 20 hours of night-time driving. The Graduated Licensing Scheme, including effective learner driver training is all about reducing the crash rate for young drivers." said Ms Beresford.

Course participants will be in the running to win a voucher for a professional driving lesson for their learner. Each participant will be given a course material folder, light supper and some key strategies giving them increased confidence when teaching their learner.
