

The bus lines now have cover and the Year 11 is also covered. area While at the moment there is much inconvenient work underway, by the end of the year the grounds, the oval and road works will be completed and we will have a new canteen and amenities block. As our student numbers steadily



grow, we hope that a new building will eventually replace the demountable rooms.

I thank the Parents and Citizen's Association for their energy in supporting our students and staff. This small, energetic and unfailingly positive group has generated many thousands of dollars that has gone directly to the support of students. Parental support of car boot sales, of BBQs and of the canteen has bought many teaching resources, built COLAs, purchased football and other jerseys and provided seating in the quad.

My final thank you is to the students of Yass High. It is you who makes us what we are and what we can be. I am always impressed by the natural honesty and friendship that students show to each other. Their maturing sense of responsibility, concern for each other, their tolerance of differences, patience and persistence with learning and their humour when solving problems all contribute to a safe, creative and happy Yass High School.

The benefits of staying at school

In NSW the changes to the school leavingage introduced on 1st January 2010, requiring all students to complete year 10. In addition, if a student is under 17 and wants to leave school after year 10, they need to be in vocational training, an apprenticeship or paid employment for an average of at least 25 hours per week.

The NSW Department of Education and Training's senior manager overseeing the change, Pam Ryan sees the legislation 'as a really extraordinary opportunity to do some reshaping of secondary education'.

So what are the key benefits of staying at school?

Studies show that students who complete Year 12 enjoy improved job prospects and the opportunity to achieve a higher income.

Recently, we celebrated Reconciliation Week at Yass High School. On Friday 27th May a group of students accompanied by Mrs Chapman and Ms Pinson represented the school at the flag-raising ceremony at the Memorial Hall. 



School Captains Craig Wilkinson, Rebecca McLean, Holly Murphy and Nathan Furry are interested in keeping our school safe through students supporting each other.

Five ways to help you child manage Facebook

- 1. Sign up for your own Facebook account, work out how to make a few friends and spend a couple of hours navigating your way around.
- 2. Find the privacy settings in the drop down menu by clicking on 'Account' in the top right hand corner on the page. Facebook organises privacy settings into 'Everyone', 'Friends of friends', Friends only' and 'Customise', which can restrict access to an individual or small group.
- 3. Search for your child online yourself. You may find that their profile information including their name, phot, and a list of names of all their friends can be accessed by anyone with a computer.
- 4. Then, ask your child to show you how their privacy settings are configured and find out whether they understand them.
- 5. Also ask them to show you how to block someone, how to refuse a friend request from a stranger and how to un-tag themselves from other people's photos; that is, take their searchable name off an image.

Keeping it simple

Dawn Bartlett, Yass High School, Yass, NSW Mark Reid, Research School of Computer Science, Australian National University (ANU)

"Keep it simple" is the message from Dawn in her partnership with Mark. In just a couple of face-to-face visits a year, Mark and Dawn have shown students real life applications of mathematics and broadened their awareness about where maths can take them in the future.

Mark worked with Year 11 maths students to explain how his field of research in machine learning relies heavily on probability. Through using spam email and the way junk email filters learn, Mark put the topic of probability into a context the students could relate to.


"I appreciate the opportunity to encourage others to get excited about mathematics. Finding the sweetspot between glossing over technical detail and not misrepresenting the ideas is challenging but rewarding," Mark reflected.

Students were fascinated to discover maths is much more than solving problems in a text book. Being able to interact with a real life mathematician has meant they can see maths as a career path. Nick summed this up, "It was good to get a different perspective on maths and to hear Mark's story."

From this interaction, work placements were created for Nick and Tom, with Tom spending time with Mark solving a variety of maths problems both by hand and through programming.

Dawn is enthusiastic about the influence their partnership is having on students and staff and is planning to extend it to Year 8 maths students later this year. "Keep it simple don't over extend either your mathematician's commitment or yours. Having only a few interactions a year is fantastic."

Yass High School is integral to our community, as such our Information and Resource Centre is not only a centre for learning and resources for our students but also for the broader community.

The opportunity to access and learn about using media applications using the school computers has been especially well utilized supporting student work across a variety of subject areas. A new forum open to students to explore and utilize their ICT skills is via the new **Movie Mania Club** blog – COMING SOON. The blog will give students a monitored forum to express opinions and discuss ideas relevant to movies held in the Library. All movies are of an appropriate 'viewer rating' further encouraging deeper thinking as students unpack themes and positive messages. The blog will further support students providing a scaffold to explore, develop and analyse their writing and thinking skills.

The NSW Premiers Reading Challenge (PRC) is designed to encourage students to find enjoyment in reading for recreation and to promote reading to expand knowledge. To complete the Challenge students must read 20 books up to September 2011 (students can claim books read from September 2010). An extensive list of suggested reading has been compiled by the PRC. Students from Years 7 to 9 are invited to join the Challenge, where upon successful completion of the Challenge students will receive a certificate of accomplishment from the NSW Premier and appear on the PRC Honours Roll. Already approximately 40 students have joined the Challenge, if you would like to become part of this awesome activity then register your name with Ms Rajchert in the Library and to receive your reading log sheet.

New titles in our collection this month are varied: *Why did Knights Fight?, Why were Mummies Wrapped?, Battle Zones,* and a series of graphic novels including: *Hamlet, Frankenstein,* and *Treasure Island (Dracula –* coming soon). The fiction collection continues to expand with the addition of many new titles: *Stresshead* by Allayne Webster is a great read and very relevant to the pressures that many students feel about school, family and life in general: *Just a Girl* by Jane Caro takes the reader back in time to England of the 1500's, the story is about Elizabeth I and takes us on a journey through her childhood and the monarchy: *A Pocketful of Eyes* by Lili Wilkinson is an entertaining and upbeat romantic comedy/crime novel: *Dress Rehearsal* by Zoe Thurner is reported to appeal to both boys and girls, a story about Lara Pearlman and her appetite for life – acting, friends, muffins and chocolate.

With more new titles arriving each month and new activities to become involved in, the Library is the place to be. Be part of the action and enjoy all or some of the wonderful experiences on offer – Reading, studying, movies, games, ICT, research, blogging, socialization. It's all there, in YOUR Library – the Information and Resource Centre.

And don't forget......The study centre continues to support all students from years 7 through 12. Every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, the Centre will be open till 4:15pm supporting student learning providing a place for study, homework, research, and organization. Homework and Multi-tasking

Can kids really do their homework and multi-task? Parents around the world are divided on this.

Half watch their teenagers sitting among a pile of books, earphones in, computer on, TV humming in the background and think, "I wish I could multi-task like that".

The others stride across the room, pull the plug on the distractions, and ask the age-old question: "How can you study with that on?"

What does the international research reveal about multi-tasking?

Here is a summary of the key findings:

- Teenagers might be regularly multi-tasking, but that doesn't mean they are performing the tasks to the best of their ability.
- Research has shown that multi-tasking reduces focus.
- Dedicated study time without distractions produces better learning.
- Multi-tasking is an unavoidable part of life, but it's best if teenagers don't try to do it while studying.

So the question isn't, "Should we multi-task?" - life is full of multi-tasking moments for us all. It's more a matter of when we should 'power down' and focus.

Rather than pulling the plug on every possible distraction ask your child to schedule some focused study time each day, at least for their most challenging subjects. Multi-tasking is an essential skill to have, but when you really need to study, it could be working against you.



Representing the School

Students take part in a range of activities in which they represent the school, from course excursions to sporting competitions. As school representatives their appearance and behaviour is on show and it is important that the message they give to the community is a positive one.

Students are reminded of the following guidelines for students wishing to represent the school or attend excursions:

- 1. Good work record e.g. no outstanding assessment tasks.
- 2. Positive behaviour on previous school excursions.
- 3. Show school pride by wearing school uniform at school and on extra-curricular activities.
- 4. Excursion fees to be paid at least one week in advance for known dates and three days before with state knockout competitions. If there is financial difficulty, students can speak to the supervising teacher and make alternative arrangements
- 5. Students on banned lists as a result of previous suspensions are excluded.
- 6. Acceptable attendance and no outstanding truancy issues.
- 7. Acceptable school behaviour.

Details about uniform, behaviour and attendance are recorded in RISC, the Register of Individual Student Contact and can be easily accessed by teachers organising teams and excursions. Students are encouraged to be familiar with these guidelines so they don't exclude themselves from excursions and sporting events such as Zone Athletics.

Tennis

Our girls tennis team made it through to the area quarter finals after a strong showing in winning the Tableland Zone competition held in Goulburn. National Survey of Young Australians 2011 Information and Guidelines

About the project

- The National Survey of Young Australians is conducted by Mission Australia, a national community service organisation. The survey has been conducted annually since 2002. Last year, around 50,000 young Australians took part.
- The survey captures the views of young Australians aged 11 to 24 on a range of topics, including what they value, their issues of concern, who they go to for advice and support, what activities they are involved in and how they feel about the future. A range of demographic information is also collected, such as age, gender and location.
- The information gathered will be used to produce a report which is distributed widely each year to schools, community organisations and policy makers. The results of the survey assist with the development of programs and services that meet the needs of young people as well as being a key resource document for policy makers. They are also a valuable resource for young people, their families and those who support them.

Participating in the project

If young people are interested in taking part in the project, they are asked to complete the survey questionnaire. The survey is available in both paper and online format. The paper survey is one page (front and back). The online survey is available at <u>www.MAYouthSurvey.com.au</u>. The survey should take approximately 20 minutes to complete. It is open to any young person in Australia aged 11 to 24.

Voluntary consent

Participation in the survey is **voluntary** and the young person must consent to take part in the research. When a survey is completed and returned to us we will infer that the young person has given their consent to take part. Young people can be encouraged to complete the survey by outlining the aims and benefits of the research, but cannot be forced or coerced into completing it. They may change their minds about completing the survey at any time and may also decline to answer any questions or parts of questions.

Anonymity and confidentiality

The survey is **anonymous** and the responses to the surveys are **confidential.** Young people should not provide their names on the survey form and surveys should not be read by anyone other than the researchers.
