### Year 11 Study Day

Year 11 began term 4 with a study day aimed at supporting them to 'reach their potential' as they begin their HSC journey. In the morning, students attended four workshops which covered note-taking and summarizing, improving comprehension skills and learning about a new process called ALARM which helps students break down complex tasks into smaller units, categorizing them according to verbs which describe what students need to do. In the afternoon, students were addressed by Senior Constable Gary Mutton on safe celebrations.

Evaluations indicated that the students appreciated the knowledge and skills gained on the day. Thanks to Bill Waterhouse from regional office and Senior Constable Mutton as well as the teachers who ran sessions on the day and Ms Vandermeys and Ms Shannon who provided delicious food to sustain students during the day.

### **HSC Seminars**

During the holidays, the school library was open and Ms Shannon provided supervision and tuition to students wanting a quiet study environment or some last minute English tips. Ms Randall also gave up holiday time to work with physics students.

For the second year, Yass High School ran HSC seminars for students during the first week of term. The sessions were voluntary but students turned up in great numbers for some structured revision and reassurance before their exams.

Our students have an excellent venue in which to take exams. The school is very grateful to the Baptist Church for allowing students to use their church during the exam weeks. The venue allows students to concentrate and do their best in a calm and quiet environment.

Exams finish on Thursday 8th November and the Year 12 Formal is the following evening.

### **Edmodo connects learners**

Parents may have heard their sons and daughters talking about a new social network tool which some teachers are using to enhance learning in the classroom. The secure site enables teachers to post work and resources and provides a forum for discussion. Students can post their work on the site, whether it is written assignments, photos or videos.

It's a great way to teach and learn and students who miss a class can soon catch up or post a question about what is going on. Edmodo helps students to take responsibility for their learning and makes the business of learning lots of fun.

This week teachers were introduced to another tool which enables teachers and students to stay in touch. Adobe Connect can be accessed on laptops and will allow teachers to build and maintain their own learning networks as well as assist group work within and between classes

### Focusing on school values

Each Tuesday B students are spending half an hour in their house roll groups discussing what our school values look like in the classroom. In the first session, students talked about what respect means and how their behaviour can reflect this. Speaking politely, listening to others, accepting difference and looking after property were some of the behaviours discussed. More recently students considered the importance of responsibility including accepting the consequences for the choices we make. Posters including the students' own words and artwork will be created and placed in classrooms to remind students of expectations.

### **Uniform Update**

Students are looking great in their white summer T shirts. These can be purchased from the school and are very easy to wash and dry. Girls should be wearing navy skirts or shorts. Please ensure that shorts are of an appropriate length. Boys can also begin wearing navy which will be phased in as the new colour over the next 12 months. Until then grey shorts are also acceptable. Students must wear enclosed footwear for practical lessons, including PDHPE.

Students who are on display in the park or on the oval at lunch time are expected to be in correct uniform. This also applies to students attending excursions and sport outside the school.

We appreciate the support of parents in ensuring that students look like they belong at school and are ready to focus on learning.

### **Attendance improvement**

School attendance at Yass High School has improved over the last few months as teachers and parents unite to encourage good habits among students.

Punctuality is highly prized by employers and arriving on time enables students to attend all classes.

Parents are reminded to let the school know if students are absent by ringing the school or writing a note explaining absences.

### Filming without consent not allowed

It is illegal to film or photograph another person without their consent and students are reminded that at school this means parental consent. Students must not use their phones or other devices to film people or events at school unless this is part of a designated school project under the supervision of the teacher.

Mobile phones are a useful communication device but should not be used for social networking during class time. Harassment or threatening behaviour using a phone will not be tolerated.

The residents who live there have fascinating stories that they will share with us. Last week when we were there we learnt that there was one lady who could speak 5

different languages. There was also a man who was a prisoner of war in World War 2 and was forced to eat nothing but rice for three years. Because of this, he refuses to eat rice today, understandably. The books will be something special that they can treasure and in time, their families can keep and cherish.

At Valmar community services, there were various jobs involved, the one I did was helping with cooking. We cooked quiches with the help of Megan (one of the workers at Valmar). We also did other things such as painting nails and singing and dancing to music with them. We then got to sit down and eat the quiches we made. We are planning on going back every Friday for the rest of the term. Next week we have organized to do some face painting and crafty things.

The community garden people are going to the gardens near Zack's place to create a nice garden for our lovely community, Yass. It will be a place where people can go to relax and chill out with their friends and family. Some of the activities we will be doing are creating a playground for kids, mowing the lawns, planting plants, maintaining the weeds and painting things.



We will also like to thank all the people who donated materials for Do Good Fridays. The Council and Mr Bush have very kindly donates their time and money to help us help the community. We will have lots of fun and are looking forward to creating something fantastic.

### **Yass Education Foundation**

Students who will be leaving school to go on to further study at University, TAFE, CIT or private tertiary colleges are encouraged to apply for some financial assistance from Yass Education Foundation. YFE is a member of **The Country Education Foundation**, which has been giving grants to students since 1993.

YEF has been collecting donations from local people and holding fund raising activities so that local youth can achieve their goals. The amount they grant is often matched by the universities.

In 2011 alone CEF gave 349 grants to rural youth with a total value of \$372,595. CEF aims to support rural youth to achieve their post school aspirations. It is harder for them to go on to tertiary education, as evidenced by the participation rate of 18% compared to 26% of metropolitan students. Grants typically range from \$500 to \$3,500 as reimbursement for pre-agreed expenses.

The grants are not awarded on academic success but on 3 criteria:

- that they have realistic goals,
- that they have shown dedication to achieving their goals
- that they are in need of financial assistance to achieve their further education, training or career goals.

### **Uniform Survey Results from the P&C**

- 398 people responded to survey. 19 invalid and results not recorded.
- Survey was conducted online and in print.
- All current staff, students, parents & community members of YHS were given the opportunity to respond to the survey as well as the incoming Year 6 students and parents from feeder primary schools.

The surveys showed that

- YHS community supports the wearing of a school uniform
- YHS community supports the uniform being available locally at reasonable costs
- The most supported summer styles for the girls were the skirt (44%) and microfibre shorts (41%)
- A school dress was supported by 24% of respondents.
- The most supported summer styles for the boys were microfibre shorts (58%) and cargo shorts (42%)
- For winter the microfiber tracksuit pant was the most popular option for boys (60%) and girls (44%) closely followed by fleecy tracksuit pants (34%)
- The colour of the boys uniform was overall in favour of navy blue (54%) with grey (41%) and either colour (5%).

The P&C discussed all the results from the survey and prepared recommendations for the school executive. It was decided to not explore the option of a dress due to the high cost and because girls already had the choice of a skirt or shorts. The P&C drew the conclusion, that the colour of the boy's uniform should change to navy blue as the styles identified in the survey are more readily available in navy blue.

The P&C presented new School Uniform Guidelines to the school principal reflecting the survey results and discussions held at meetings over 2012. These guidelines were then presented at a September executive meeting for discussion. The guidelines were accepted by the school executive and will become effective for 2013.

Please note that changes to the school uniform will be phased in over a 12 month period. The school does not expect families to purchase new items immediately but wait and replace as existing uniform items have been outgrown. This means that in 2013 both navy blue and grey will be acceptable uniform for boys.

Twelve Aboriginal teenagers from regional NSW have had a taste of an air force career. The inaugural Indigenous Student Military Familiarisation Camp (ISMFC) was held at the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) base at Richmond north-west of Sydney.

"This joint initiative demonstrates the Government's focus on Closing the Gap and encourages young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people from urban and regional communities to pursue their interest in aviation," Defence Science and Personnel Minister Warren Snowdon said. The students, aged 16 to 18, were selected for their interest in aviation through the auspices of the Illawarra Aboriginal



Corporation, which manages Boorowa Aviation, a project originally developed to create opportunities in the aviation industry for Indigenous Australians.

Throughout the week-long visit, the students experienced a range of activities including a flight simulator visit, personal training sessions as well as fire, weapons and safety equipment demonstrations.

The group flew to RAAF Base Richmond from Illawarra Regional Airport with the Australian Aerial Patrol before visiting key locations at RAAF Base Richmond including a C-130 Hercules

and simulator. ISMFC participants will have the opportunity to discuss their career options with a mentor who can assist them further in pursuing an air force career after they finish their schooling. The ISMFC program aims to inspire Indigenous students with a passion for aviation and was designed to increase participation rates of Indigenous Australians in the air force.

### Last man dancing 🕲

Hello my name is Jacob Davison, a Year 10 student at Yass High School. At the start of term 2 I met Uncle Ron and he introduced Indigenous dance to Yass High.



I wasn't too sure about it but I thought I would give it a go. Every Wednesday Uncle Ron came and taught us local Indigenous dances and language and every week I got more confidence in myself.

On our first performance all the boys choked and left me, last man standing with seven girls, Pynjarra, Marcayla, Madison, Vanessa, Jasmine, Taylor and Ashleigh.

We started the performance with Vanessa and I doing the acknowledgement to country in Ngunnawal language, and then we started to dance. The dances were the clearing dance, welcome dance and the animal dance. We were all nervous at the start then we became more confident as we danced.

Half way through Term 3, Uncle Bob, Uncle Ron and my school's Principal, Ms Hiscock approached Tayla and I to see if we would be interested in attending a dance camp at Redfern, NCIE, for the week 26<sup>th</sup>-31<sup>st</sup> August.

On the 26<sup>th</sup>August we travelled to Sydney with Uncle Ron. While we were in Sydney we learnt many new dances including NSW Indigenous, Torres Strait islander, Contemporary and Hip-Hop dances.

We took a train from Redfern to Gosford for a day and Joy Clancy the coordinator took us to Naisda Dance Collage and attended two dance classes in Jazz and Ballet that took all day. It was great and I got heaps out of it. The same day we went to the Sydney Opera House to watch a Brazilian Dance Group, it was great. They did all sorts of dances, hip-hop, South American and contemporary dance styles.

On the last day of the camp we performed in front of a small audience at the Redfern dance studio. We practised all morning on our dances, I was nervous. Then we performed, after we performed we had lunch and said all of our goodbyes, it was sad. This experience has inspired me to do better at school and dancing. I see the rewards come to those who have a go and believe in themselves. Tayla and I were also awarded Students of the Week at school on our return.

### TAFE Alternative Schools Program From the Principal's Blog

With the scrapping of a formal state-wide school certificate and the raised leaving age, Year 10 has become a transition year from the junior to the senior school.

Many of our Year 10 students have taken the opportunity in the latter half of the year to take part in the Alternate Learning Program offered by Yass TAFE campus, with some even travelling to Goulburn and Queanbeyan for courses there.

The students attend the TAFE for one day a week where they are introduced to such trades as wool classing, child services, occupational health and safety, barista work, small engines, workplace hygiene, bricklaying and horticulture.

The students seem to be enjoying the challenge in a different setting, away from their traditional school studies. It is hoped that they utilise the TAFE experiences to set personal direction for their senior years.
