From the Deputy

Mobile phones continue to be source of delight and а frustration. The delight mostly belongs to students who enjoy the opportunities to engage with friends 24/7 (even during lesson time, if they can manage it). The frustration is felt by parents who have to take part in exhausting negotiations to prise the devices from students' fingers



so they can participate in family life and sleep at night and by teachers, like myself, who find ourselves in multiple daily conversations about the purpose of school (education) and the effect of an active phone (distraction and potential harm to wellbeing). Like many aspects of behaviour, a focus on the positives, a calm consistent response to those unwilling to comply and engagement in something greater are hallmarks of the most effective response.

We focus on the positives through our Positive Behaviour for Learning program in which students gain Ys for following school values and are acknowledged as meeting school values when they attend our reward excursions (coming up later this term).

Our calm consistent approach can be seen in every classroom where posters reminding students that devices should be 'off and away' are on display, where teachers ask students to take to the office phones which are 'out' or 'on' and where I follow up with an interview or a phone call home if students cannot follow this natural consequence. Where students are caught up in the challenge and excitement of learning, phones are, momentarily, forgotten. I see this everyday as students catch and weigh growing lambs, create a self-portrait with pencil and crayon, master a hard won mathematical skill, perform an intricate scientific experiment or write a story of which they are proud.

Sometimes a little encouragement is needed to turn away from the comfort of the interactive device towards the endless potential of learning. I encourage all students to be phone-free at school, or at the very least, between break times, so young minds can be fully focused on the delights of learning.

Most work placements of one week will hopefully take place in weeks 6,7 and 8 or between Nov 13 and Dec 1. Some students are lucky enough to do more than one VET course so have to organise their time to complete multiple work placements.

ceremony as part of the Work Ready days next year.

Parents are an important part of the process with a contract between the student, school, parents and employers having to be signed and returned before the work placement can go ahead. Our shared responsibility to produce work-ready industry qualified graduates from the Yass High School Community Trade Skills Centre forms an important focus for every student.



Year 11 Make Possum Boxes for Wildcare

Year 11 construction students have been making possum boxes for Wildcare for several years, in conjunction with WIRES. Jane and Kevin Baker from Wildcare recently picked up the latest 25 box batch. This has been done with the assistance of teacher Ralf Hansson.

The OPAL reactor is a state-of-theart 20 megawatt multi-purpose reactor that uses low enriched uranium (LEU) fuel to achieve a

range of nuclear medicine, research, scientific, industrial and production goals.



Computational thinking *(CT)* is widely recognised as a critical skill for the digital world we live in. CT is clearly identified in NESA's draft <u>Science and Technology K-6 syllabus</u> and draft <u>Technology mandatory</u> syllabus. Whilst there is currently no clear timeline for when new documents will be implemented, NESA has published <u>A Guide to Coding and Computational Thinking across the Curriculum</u> that outlines where CT can be introduced using the current NSW syllabus. Get prepared now with free support to learn more about computational thinking and apply that learning into the existing syllabus.

The federal government's <u>Digital Technologies Hub</u> includes links to <u>professional learning</u>, <u>lesson ideas</u> and information for <u>families</u>. The DoE has developed the Technology mandatory unit, <u>Crack the Code</u> for teachers with no coding background. the NESA registered *Foundations MOOC for Primary* is at <u>CSER Digital Technologies Education</u>. CSER also funds a NSW project officer <u>Meridith Ebbs</u> to support your school or community of schools. Ask her how you can access a <u>lending library of equipment</u> for you to test before you purchase.

The <u>Australian Computing Academy</u> (ACA) offers explanations of <u>key</u> terminology in the <u>Australian Curriculum</u>: <u>Digital Technologies</u> and <u>workshops</u>. Familiarise yourself with the terminology with <u>Introduction to Computational thinking</u> on *BBC Bitesize* to . *Finally, Google* offers a free <u>computational thinking course</u>!

Year 7 finished off some great textile projects last term. They designed and made waist bags, backpacks and shoulder bags. Once completing their bag students had the chance to make pencil cases, soft toys and finish off the unit with tie dyed t-shirts.

The yellow trees demonstrate sunshine coming through the bush to display what the light can bring for the young adventurous horses. The whole quilt is a representation New Beginnings: with
