I am delighted to be contributing to my first InTouch as Principal of Yass High School.


My first week has revolved around a 'getting to know you' theme. I have been meeting and talking with teachers, students and parents as I settle into my new role and become part of this vibrant community.

Jason works Wednesdays at the SELX, taking delivery, counting, drafting and penning of sheep and lambs. He records the sale and then completes deliveries of these to the buyers and processors. Sale days are busy and require a lot concentration, recording, and effective oral and written communication. Jason works

within our team but also with 11 other Livestock Agencies and has shown that he is a very capable and valued member.

Over the last 12 months we have been able to see the benefit that this has provided Jason and enjoy the personal satisfaction in watching his commitment to school and workplace skills improve.

We are very much looking forward to having Jason as part of our team again next year as he enters Year 10, but also what the future may hold for him after school."
