
The setting was also chosen for them, a pet shop, and the story took 9.5 hours to complete.



Tell Them From Me Survey

This year our school, like many other public schools in the state, will participate in a Department of Education initiative: the Tell Them From Me student feedback survey. The survey measures factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other student outcomes. The focus of the NSW-wide survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices.

You may remember that our students also participated in a Tell Them From Me student survey in Term 1 this year. Asking students to complete the survey twice in one year allows us to identify trends in student responses as well as track engagement and motivation across the school year.

The survey is a great opportunity for our students to provide us with valuable and quick feedback on what they think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. More than 6,300 schools in Australia and around the world have used Tell Them From Me to survey 5.4 million students. Capturing the voices of our students will help improve how we do things at our school.

It will be administered during school hours between 27 August and 26 October. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary.

The first student to show Mr. Duncan their complete solution to this problem before school will be awarded a prize.


Year 7 & 8
