
Yass High School is fortunate to have such a depth of student leadership. This term will continue the excellent work carried out by our 2018 – 2019 school leaders.



### **Deputy Report**

Over the holidays I spent quite a bit of time analysing both our NAPLAN results and the behaviour in our school. I will share my findings around NAPLAN and Bump It Up next newsletter, this time I will focus on the analysis of the behaviours that prevent students from learning to their potential.

As you can see from the chart below, most of our poor behaviour stems from not following teachers' instructions. This covers both small incidents and larger ones that may eventually result in suspensions.



Following instructions are in two categories: those that are expected behaviours and those that are specific and timely instructions given in the class or playground. Examples of expected behaviours are: having phones off and away; wearing uniform; having equipment out; hats off inside.

Specific behaviours might include being directed to: sit in a specific place; move away from another student; exit an area; pay attention to a particular person.

In all situations students are expected to follow the teachers' instructions, and if they need to question the reasons behind the direction, they should do that at the end of class.





A long narrow hexagon is composed of 22 equilateral triangles of unit side length. In how many ways can this hexagon be tiled by 11 rhombuses of unit side length?




### Stage 5:

Learning Labs workshops cover a range of diverse and innovative disciplines that are designed to challenge and stimulate the interest of self-motivated and curious learners. Here are **some examples of what's coming up** in January:



#### **Ocean Engineering**

Do you like designing and building? Do like being around water or the ocean? Well this workshop is for you. In this workshop you'll be working in small groups to designing and build from scratch a remote controlled sailing vessel to carry cargo in a simulated ocean generated by the Universities wave maker.

This is an important mission, seeing as 90% of all container goods are moved by ship. But don't worry, we will give you the engineering skills needed to design a sturdy vessel.



#### **Mythbusting Physics**

Are you interested in what physics is and how it influences our everyday life? Have you seen things in movies that you suspect are impossible?

This workshop will look at common misconceptions and physical impossibilities, before getting to grips with the real physics. You will carry out experiments and take part in demonstrations, learn fundamental physics concepts, and work out what the movies ought to have shown.



#### **Momentum Mathematics**

Learn the secrets of SPEED MATHEMATICS. You will amaze yourself, family and friends when you discover the world of mentally multiplying very large numbers faster than you could tap the digits into a calculator. You will learn to recognise patterns and increase your speed and accuracy. Mental mathematics not only enhances the precision of thought but it improves your memory.
