
The winner of our 200 Club was Geoff Frost who kindly donated his \$75 winnings back to the fundraiser.


Stage 4 & 5 Problem of the Fortnight

Human Rights Essay – Zara Vale

Everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and association. - Universal Declaration of Human Rights, article 20

The right to protest is fundamental to our human rights. The Declaration of Human Rights is a document created to put down in words a set of rights that are set to entitled to humans around the world, regardless of sex, religion, ethnicity or political affiliation.

Protesters gather because it is their duty to uphold their right of public assembly. They do so because they know that by peaceful demonstration they will achieve their goal of a better world.

It would be a violation of all our rights if they didn't express their opinion and act as people to move towards a world in which we can all thrive.

But they aren't met kindly by all. Leaders seek to suppress protesters because they threaten their grip on power. PM Scott Morrison has claimed that 'we do not support out schools being turned into parliaments'. In response to the over 240 casualties and nearly 1000 injured as a result of gun violence in the U.S. in 2019 alone, President Donald Trump has failed to produce a solution that many Americans find acceptable hinting that people protesting against gun violence are Democrats trying to impinge on the rights of gun owners, twisting protests to suit his political ends.

The initially peaceful protests conducted by residents of Hong Kong to push their government towards democracy, protesters were met with tear gas and politicians accusing harmless gatherers of initiating a riot.

These are examples of people being stripped of their rights. This not only disrespects protesters and forfeits their status as humans, but it escalates tension in the gatherings, driving peaceful protesters to extreme measures. Suicides. Vandalism of parliament. Attacking journalists. This has also triggered an increase in the extremity of police tactics. Water cannons have been used to deflect crowds. Civilians and protesters alike have been attacked in public areas, such as the Prince Edward train station. Protesters have been killed.

In taking away the right to protest in peace, peace is taken out of the picture. Sometimes it is crucial to break the law to obtain our human rights. In denying Hong Kong protesters their right as human beings to express their opinions, their right to democracy and their right to tranquil assembly, violence has spread and lives have been lost. It is not only crucial that we are given our liberties because we deserve them, but it is tantamount that we are given them so we can all live in a safe, equal and amiable society.

"Remember always that you have not only the right to be an individual; you have an obligation

to be one. You cannot make any useful contribution in life unless you do this." - Eleanor Roosevelt.

Girls Rock Camp Canberra - by Zara Vale

Girls Rock Camp is a music program aimed towards young musicians. First established in Portland, OR, Girls Rock focuses on motivating young girls, trans, non-binary and gender diverse people and to teach them music skills, no matter how much experience they may or may not have on their instrument. I attended their five-day program in Canberra during these past holidays; here's some information about what it involves.

At Girls Rock Camp, you are assigned an instrument of your choice from guitar, bass, drums, electronics and vocals. You participate in amazing workshops, like 'Experimental Voice Workshop' and 'Zine Making Workshop'. We also listened to a bunch of interesting talks from experienced musicians, like Grace Stevenson - whose songs have played on Rage many times - who talked about how to feel confident in a genre that isn't conventional, and from sound engineer, musician and music producer Becki Whitton, who performs under the stage name Aphir.

At the start of the day, you participate in two hours of instrument instruction from experienced musicians. The guitar mentor was Kristy, an awesome Canberra-based rocker who has been playing for over thirty years. Campers are also put into bands. During the program, your band writes and perfects a song, which is performed on the fifth day during the showcase concert. My band members were Red, on rhythm guitar and vocals, Ruben, on vocals and AB on drums - I was lead guitar. Bands are assigned two band mentors - ours were Steph and Lydia. Girls Rock Camp is an amazing experience for any girl, trans or gender non-conforming identifying musician. It teaches confidence and self-worth as well as music. It affirms that you don't have to make music like Taylor Swift, be a boy or be pretty and submissive to be successful in the music industry and in life in general. I have made quite a few supportive and musically minded friends during my time at Girls Rock Camp Canberra, and I highly recommend the experience to anyone.
