Last semester, the Year 12 Textile and Design students had the chance to have a workshop with Internationally renowned Australian fashion desinger, Akira Isogowa. They travelled to Sydney in the one day and had the chance to learn some of his techniques, see his work at his show at the Powerhouse Museum and talk to him about his 25 years of fashion design. This was a once in a lifetime experience and a wonderful chance to see and meet an artist who they study in their course.



A week later the same Year 12 class and Year 10 Textile students had the opportunity to visit Sydney for an overnight excursion. They enjoyed staying at the Central Youth Hostel and experienceing city life, multicultural food and icons, such as Starbucks. They visited The TEXSTYLE exhibition, which is a showcase of the best NSW Year 12 textile projects from last year, held at Ultimo Tafe Fashion School. They went to the Powerhouse Museum as well and saw many exhibits and played on the amazing equipment outside.



On the second day students attended a fashion drawing workshop at Whitehouse Institute of Fashion. They enjoyed a tour of the fashion school and had an exciting morning drawing the fashion figure using a variety of mediums.

One of the students, Emily Fuller, won a three day fashion workshop, to be run in these holidays, at the Institute in Sydney. Overall it was a wonderful time to see lots of new things and be inspired by creative people. The students are to be congratulated for their behaviour and participation.



Australian Youth Aerospace Forum

During the holidays, I enjoyed a weeklong camp at the Brisbane AYAF (Australian Youth Aerospace Forum) University of Queensland to learn about aerospace engineering. We started off with an activity where we built gliders out of balsa wood and flew them with varying degrees of success. After that we had a tour of the university where we saw their wind tunnels, car



workshop, and my personal favourite the UQ space workshop where we were able to see the rocket Athena, that won the 10,000 ft challenge.



The next day we built model rockets that would fly as high as possible and keep a single egg safe. We then travelled over to the Queensland museum to see the 'NASA: a Human Adventure' exhibit, which held many different items from the history of spaceflight, both Russian and American. We launched our rockets. half of them failed in spectacular "eggsplosions". There was a careers day where we had a plenty of companies talk about their workplaces, such as Boeing, UQ Space, Air Force, and Griffith University. The next day we made the trip to Griffith University and we participated in a flight simulator, and drone guidditch. Each activity had its difficulties own

especially with flying a virtual Boeing 737.

The next day we went on some industry visits where we were able to see Airbus A380s during their maintenance, some massive engines up close.

The last day we went to the RAAF (Royal Australian Air Force) base Amberley where we saw a number of growlers take off as they were doing an exercise that day. At the end of this amazing visit we were able to look inside a C-17 troop transport. In the end I made lots of friends and connections and had the most amazing week of my life.

Stage 4:


Pictures of fruit have been placed in this grid to represent numbers less than 10.

FACTSHEET

No knives at school – parent factsheet

Health and Safety Directorate



There is no good reason to bring a knife to school.

NSW now has the toughest knife laws in Australia. As a parent, you need to be aware of these laws, as you can also be charged if you allow your child to carry a knife.

No knives allowed at school under any circumstances

If a student has a knife at school the principal may call the police.

The student may be expelled or suspended immediately. Possessing a knife includes your child simply having one in their bag or locker. Having a knife for self-protection is also illegal. If you are concerned about your child's wellbeing or safety, contact the principal.

Tough penalties apply for children convicted of knife offences, including gaol sentences of up to 25 years if someone is injured with a knife during an assault.

Every child has the right to feel safe and secure at school. There is no good reason for a child to ever have a knife at school.

If you want to talk about children and knives at school, please contact the principal.

What kind of knives are prohibited?

As school policy is designed to keep all students safe, no type of knife is allowed at school. That means no butter knives or fruit knives in lunchboxes, or knife tools for craft purposes.

Flick knives, ballistic knives, sheath knives, push daggers, trench knives, butterfly knives and star knives are all prohibited.

Your child cannot bring to school any item that can be used as a weapon (such as a chisel).

In lessons requiring the use of knives, for example cooking or trades, your child's teacher will supply and supervise the use of the tools.

There are some senior subjects, such as hospitality, where children may be required to have their own knives.

Your child's school will advise you about these courses and the procedures for carrying knives legally to and from school.

The law makes parents responsible

You need to make certain your child is aware of the school's rules and the State laws about knives.

If you allow your child to carry or possess a knife at school or in a public place, you can be charged.

The police can search any child they suspect of having a knife. They can confiscate any dangerous object they might find during the search.


Your child must comply with such a police search, or they may be arrested and charged.

It is also illegal for anyone to sell a knife to anyone who is less than 16 years old
