I am writing to you from the midst of a very quiet school as we end Term 1. I reflect on our first assembly of the year when we welcomed Year 7 into our school community, recognised the introduction of Year 11 into the senior school and focused Year 12 on their last three terms of school. The year we envisaged was one that followed the same routines, milestones, events and expectations of every other school year. My how the world has changed!

Within the last three weeks, our school has totally re-imagined how we teach and learn, connect with each other, care for each other and continue to work towards achieving our goals. Although the process of doing each of these things has changed, the reasons remain the same.

I would like to acknowledge the amazing talents of all staff as they have moved into a new way of working with agility, determination, great skill and enduring care for their students. Many of us have had to very quickly learn how to use new technologies for providing opportunities, maintaining communication still connecting authentically with your children.

We are so proud of the way in which our students have adapted to learning in this environment. Work is accessed through on-line platforms such as Google Classroom and Microsoft Teams, conversations are occurring remotely in the Zoom and Teams worlds and work is being submitted online. The resilience and commitment of our young people towards maintaining their drive towards success is a strong statement on their character as local and global citizens.

My most heartfelt appreciation is directed towards our parents and carers. Overnight you have embraced a greater responsibility for guiding the learning of your children in a largely on-line environment that is unfamiliar to many.

From the Principal

Please be assured that what you are doing is good enough – even if it looks different from what other parents or carers are doing.

Your children's teachers still have the responsibility and oversight for the education of every child and will make sure that you know if there are any academic or wellbeing concerns that arise.

This challenging task has been exacerbated by the self-isolation and social distancing regulations in force across communities. I know that your children are missing the social interactions that occur in and out of school; they are missing the connections with their teachers and support staff, as well as the comfort of the structure that school provides (and against which a few rally from time to time!).

Like you, I find the uncertainty of Term 2 difficult. You are trying to organise how your family will manage over a possibly extended period of isolation and distancing; we are trying to plan for continuation of remote teaching and learning, as well as for the resumption of 'normal' school when it occurs. It is important that, for families who are able to do so, children continue to be kept at home and engage in the current mode of learning. It is very difficult to maintain social distancing at school for more than a very few number of students. Teachers are increasingly being directed to work from home to assist with this social distancing and most of our casual teachers have indicated that they are not available for employment until the COVID-19 situation is resolved. Even though I am sure that the temptation to return your children to school next term is high, I remind you that schools are open for children of essential workers (and, yes, this definition is hazy); our ability to staff the supervision of larger numbers of students is low and would ultimately require teachers being moved for certain days off remote teaching platforms and into classrooms to supervise students at school. Active teaching will not resume until the Department of Education directs a return to normal duties.

Thankfully the Easter break has arrived! I hope that, as a family, you are able to take time to rest, re-charge and re-invigorate for the next stage. Please encourage your children to have a holiday and to build exercise, enjoyment and rest into their days. I thank you for the huge amount of support that we have received at school. Please know that we are here to help you and your children in any way that we can. I know that we will all emerge stronger both personally and as a community when this ends...and it will.


I wish you all a wonderful Easter and look forward to continuing to work with you in Term 2.

#### **Captains Corner**




I love films, funky fashion and dogs especially when you can combine all three. When I am not teaching, you will find me snuggling with my dogs Teddy and Bosley.










#### **YHS Help! Button**
