2021 has been a rollercoaster! We had lots planned, but COVID had other ideas for us. Despite this, we still had a great year of celebrating Ngunnawal culture and country. 2022 looks set to be even better!

We started the year with Buddy and Dale from Gugan Gulwan and our Indigenous Woodwork Group. Gugan Gulwan continue to provide us with lots of support and we are so grateful to have partnered with them to provide opportunities for our students. One such event was the 'More Cultural Rehabs, Less Jails' talk some of our senior students attended in Canberra, where we heard Jeffery Amatto speak about his experiences. Our students found this candid talk very impactful.

A highlight of the year was the successful application of Year 10 student Rose Pearce-Collins being accepted into the Australian National University work experience program, to spend a week at the observatory at Tidbinbilla. Unfortunately this has been postponed until next year due to COVID. We look forward to hearing all about it from Rose after it finally goes ahead.

We were also very proud of Celia Chambers attending a Defence Youth Program, with the opportunity for lots of new skills and knowledge to be learnt.

Kurt Marshall pushed himself way out of his comfort zone to participate in a NSW National Parks program for indigenous students which saw him spend 5 days in and around Jindabyne being trained and mentored in Outdoor Education and Tour Guiding work.

In July we headed to Sydney to see the world famous Bangarra Dance Company performing at the Sydney Opera House. We also got to ride on trains, walk around Sydney, eat yummy food and check out the sights. We are looking forward to another trip next year, details TBA.

Sadly, COVID interrupted our NAIDOC Celebration Day and we had to postpone this to next year due to restrictions on visitors coming into school. However, we did run a very successful NAIDOC colouring competition, with entries from across the primary schools in the Yass Valley as well as our very talented high school students. Special guest judges Aunty Pam Bell and Mel McDonald had a very difficult task on their hands picking winners!

We were honoured to be joined by several Ngunnawal Elders, and lead by Mr. Scott Bell in a Closing the Gap walk around the Yass Gorge, where we learnt a lot about the history of Ngunnawal people, and life on the river. We hope to make this a regular event!

Our Indigenous Laptop Program continues, and students who need the use of a laptop for their studies in 2022 are encouraged to contact the school to enquire about this. If you are a student who currently has one of these laptops can you please return it the Library ASAP so that software updates can be done.

The Girls Yarning Circle ran for several months during the winter and provided a safe, culturally appropriate space for our young women to talk about issues that are on their mind. The Digeridoo Circle for the boys was also a place for cultural celebration, although it was another casualty of COVID.

Students were invited over the year to apply for academic camps, open days, scholarships and university taster events. Students and families are reminded to keep their eyes out for these as we send home notes and information next year. They are great fun and a good way to learn more about pathways after school.

Our Donations

Old Yass High school uniforms donated to the School for the Deaf in Dili, East Timor.

When the decision was made several years ago to transition to a new school uniform we found ourselves with a large number of redundant shirts. These shirts were no longer part of our uniform, and would not be suitable for sale in an op shop or second-hand clothes store. According to the ABC almost 305,000 tonnes of textiles were discarded in NSW last year, and only 800 tonnes were recycled. About 240,000 tonnes were sent to landfill. We thought it would be very wasteful for these shirts, some of which were brand new, to end up buried in the Jugiong landfill.

A plan was hatched, with the help of Rotary and DFAT the shirts have made their way to the School for the Deaf in Dili, East Timor. Badges with the deaf school's logo were printed, and will be sewn over the Yass High logos.

The shirts took quite some time to arrive at their new home, because along with the disruptions caused by COVID, East Timor was hit by devastating floods earlier this year with loss of life and significant damage to farms and infrastructure.

2021 Pathways Program

This year at Yass High school we trialled a new and alternate program that has provided opportunities for a mixed group of Year 9 and 10 students to be exposed to and engage with the world of work and work experience. The program began as the Pathways class in 2021 and may be more widely known as the Pathways and School to Work Transition Class in 2022.

This program has been very successful for many of our students who engaged with a range of activities such as workshops with previous students of Yass High School employed in the community, visits to farm sites, and community businesses, and engagement with TAFE Programs. Most of the students embarked on work experience at least once a week and many of those students have gained either full-time or part-time employment as a result of these opportunities. Some of our students are already looking at School Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships in 2022. All other students will attend regular work experience which will allow them to experience work one or two days a week and attend school 3 days to focus on targeted literacy and maths programs.

We already have students successfully enrolled in Certificate II and III in Agriculture thanks to the hard work of our Careers Adviser, Ms Wykes, who is heavily involved in the program. Students will also participate in their electives and a specialised COGS-based curriculum.

We have many students already newly enrolled in the 2022 program and we are excited for the many opportunities that will arise for these students in their work experiences.





Year 10

Year 10 was a big step up from Year 9. Our subjects started to prepare us for senior school by relating our studies to the HSC and our period of online learning developed us into independent learners.

We got to experience what it was like to be a leader through peer support and organising special events, making memories and bonding as a year group. Throughout it all, we have managed to push through and have successfully completed our last year of junior schooling.

Year 10 was incredibly fun!




Year 12 Formal

Yass Valley Council have approved the DA for the construction of the new multipurpose School Hall (23/11/21). Joss Constructions have begun site establishment, demolition of the current basketball court area will begin in the new year. The new hall will contain a basketball court, stage and storage; along with new staff and student amenities. It is anticipated once staff and students return to school in 2022 construction will have started.
